

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FACTS IN BRIEF

St. Mary's College of Maryland is a four-year, state-supported, liberal arts college offering the Bachelor of Arts degree in 16 disciplines.

Bachelor of Arts Degrees are offered in Anthropology/Sociology, Art, Biology, Chemistry, Dramatic Arts, Economics, History, Human Development, Language and Literature, Mathematics, Music, Natural Science, Philosophy, Political Science, Psychology, and Public Policy.

Total enrollment for the Fall, 1987, semester was 1411 students, with an FTE of 1350. Eighty-four percent of the student body are full-time students; sixty-one percent are resident students.

In 1987, 234 baccalaureate degrees were awarded as follows:
Anthropology/Sociology Art - 20, Biology - 21, Dramatic Arts - 7, Economics - 59, History - 7, Human Development - 34, Language and Literature - 13, Mathematics - 16, Music - 9, Natural Science - 6, Political Science - 14, Psychology - 21, and Public Policy - 2.

During the fall of 1987, the College employed 74 regular (state allocated line) full-time faculty, 7 temporary full-time faculty, and 43 part-time faculty. Eighty-eight percent of all full-time faculty hold doctoral degrees and another 4 percent hold terminal degrees in their respective fields. Since the 1982-83 academic year, St. Mary's College has had 9 Fulbright Scholars among the faculty.

St. Mary's occupies a 275-acre campus on the St. Mary's River. The physical plant includes 31 buildings; ten and one-half of these are student residences. The College's facilities include a 115,000 volume library, a multi-purpose fine arts center, a community center, an Olympic-size swimming pool, an outdoor track and tennis courts, two gymnasiums, and a riverfront boathouse and dock.

St. Mary's College is accredited by the Middle States Association of Colleges and Universities.

The College has an annual operating budget in excess of \$13 million. The State of Maryland provides an annual appropriation of approximately \$6.27 million.

The College reported College Endowment Funds of \$785,764 for the fiscal year ending in 1987.

HISTORY OF THE COLLEGE

In 1839 the Maryland General Assembly established a public institution of education for young women in commemoration of the Maryland Bicentennial. In 1845 St. Mary's Female Seminary opened and through the early 1900s provided an academy-style education to women. In later years the curriculum was expanded to offer a full high school program. In 1927 a junior college division was added, making this Maryland's first public junior college. Men were admitted to the school in 1949, and the name of the institution was changed from St. Mary's Female Seminary to the St. Mary's Seminary Junior College. In 1959 the secondary school program was discontinued, and the institution was accredited as St. Mary's Junior College. Finally, in 1961, the legislature authorized the development of a four-year college, changing the name to St. Mary's College of Maryland. Today St. Mary's College of Maryland provides a high-quality liberal arts program for baccalaureate students. The College is a vital segment of the state system of higher education, offering a distinctive educational program in the public sector.

COLLEGE PROFILE

St. Mary's College of Maryland is a state-supported, four-year, coeducational liberal arts college. The College is governed by an independent Board of Trustees appointed by the Governor. Located in historic St. Mary's City, 70 miles southeast of Washington, D.C., in Tidewater Maryland, the College is part of the rich Maryland heritage.

St. Mary's is committed to being, first and foremost, a fine teaching institution. A relatively small student body of approximately 1400 students allows for a favorable faculty-student ratio. The opportunity for individual attention from teachers, coupled with the excellent national reputation of the College's faculty, has resulted in St. Mary's being able to recruit and retain some of the best students in the state of Maryland. The residential nature of the College fosters an atmosphere of learning that extends well beyond the walls of the classroom. St. Mary's has established a program and reputation among public institutions which is usually associated only with fine private liberal arts colleges.
